Peace Be with You!

As we near the beginning of the beautiful season of Lent next month, I am so reminded of how important it is to take time to do an internal check-up on myself, which can include taking a deeper dive into Scripture, The Rule and other documents of the Order taking time away, look at my prayer life, my actions and how am I living out my Vocation as a Secular Franciscan, and many times just looking around me – a check up. I look to how the Lord will call me to possibly a further conversion or even awareness and how am I being cooperative. Recently, I have been asking those around me - "What are you doing for Lent this year. What are you studying"? I've enjoyed the Formed series on "How to

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Lent." (https://watch.formed.org/how-to-lent). What are you planning? Feel free to reach out to me and share what you plan to do to increase your love for the Lord. May we each feel not only His Love but His call to deeper conversion. This year we celebrate 800 years – the Canticle of Creatures. Let us sit and 'be' with the Lord.

I humbly serve you all as the Regional Minister and I am constantly aware of my feelings of inadequacy to do so. Yet our Lord has never ceased to amaze me at providing the tools for me to serve, as I'm sure many of those serving feel also. One just needs a Servant's Heart. We are approaching our Regional Chapter of Elections this July and as you'll see within this Portiuncula there is information explaining the Nomination Process. I truly invite you to review it and to submit your Nominations; especially to prayerfully discern if you feel called should you receive

a Nomination. The members of the REC are also available should you have specific questions – just reach out. May we all also join in praying our Prayer of Elections too.

Recently and throughout these last almost three years many have struggled with having to follow the governing documents. While I can understand no one likes 'rules' at times. I am constantly reminding myself for the OFS – we Professed to this Rule of life. –

I, by the grace of God, renew my baptismal promises and consecrate myself to the service of his Kingdom. Therefore, in my secular state I promise to live all the days of my life the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ in the Secular Franciscan Order by observing its rule of life.

And in Article 20 of the Rule, we are united according to the norm of this Rule and of the Constitutions. Throughout the rest of our Rule it reminds us of the importance of the Constitutions. So I invite you when you find another or even yourself feeling that there are so many 'rules' to seek out the Rule of our life and let the Holy Spirit show you that – We profess to live out the Rule but we are guided and governed by our documents to help us do so - The General Constitutions, National Statutes, and the International Statues. Take a moment to read the Decree at the beginning of the General Constitutions and the Letter of the Conference of General Ministers of the First Order and the TOR, and also the 2001 Promulgation of the General Constitutions letter from the then Minister General. I share this as many times we can take on the thoughts that it's all business, rules, etc. When in true reality we need reminding that we are an Order within Holy Mother Church and Francis calls us to honor this always.


Lectio Divina as a Lenten Practice



The holy season of Lent begins this year with the observance of Ash Wednesday on March 5, 2025. In a sense, the whole Church is invited to join us in the Order of Penance for these forty days of prayer, fasting and almsgiving in order to prepare well for a worthy celebration of the Paschal Mystery of the Lord at Easter. Article 4 of the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order instructs us that "Secular Franciscans should devote themselves to careful reading of the gospel, going from gospel to life and life to the

gospel." Especially during this Jubilee Year of God's Grace and as the Franciscan Centenaries of the final events in the earthly life of our Seraphic Father St. Francis continue to unfold, this Lent may be a very propitious time for us to focus on sacred reading, traditionally known as Lectio Divina.

The weekly Formation Friday series published by the OFS National Formation Commission focused on Lectio Divina in its May 5, 2019 edition. Author Diane Menditto, O.F.S. noted that "Many of us use Lectio Divina to pray Scripture" and she listed the four stages of the classic Lectio Divina model: Read, Reflect, Respond (pray), and Rest (contemplate). In her contribution to the For Up to Now (FUN) Manual on the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order, Teresa Baker, O.F.S. elaborated on each of these four stages which she termed "The 4 R's":



- 1) **Read** (*Lectio*): Read the Scripture passage through thoroughly.
- 2) Reflect (Meditatio): Reflect upon what you have read. Ask yourself which word, which phrase, which passage speaks to you, challenges you, tugs at you this day. Which word or passage got your attention this day? Sit with these words and allow them to penetrate your spirit.
- 3) **Respond** (Oratio): How do you respond to the stirrings in your heart, your conscience? How does this passage challenge you to look upon the world? How does it affect your interactions with others? How does it change how you see yourself? God spoke to you; what is your response to God?
- 4) Receive (Contemplatio): Sit in the silence; sit in the Presence of God: receive what it is that God is giving you. Remember: God's first language is Silence.

In the May 2019 Formation Friday article, Diane continues by asking, "How about a Franciscan take on Lectio?" and she briefly presents the model found in the writings of the Seraphic Doctor, St. Bonaventure of Bagnoregio:



1) Read; 2) Meditate; 3) Pray (contemplate); 4) Act

The first three steps lead to love and love leads to action; we are transformed by the Gospel and we PUT IT INTO ACTION.

Finally, Diane notes that St. Clare of Assisi's model of contemplation which she practiced for many years before the Crucifix of San Damiano can be very useful for us Franciscans in reading and praying the Sacred Scriptures:



- 1) Gaze [upon Him];
- 2) Consider [Him];
- 3) Contemplate [Him];
- 4) Imitate [Him]

We **gaze** (read), we **consider** (listen in the heart), we **contemplate** (allow ourselves to be challenged and transformed), and we **imitate** (become what we love in reality and action). Saint Clare wrote sometime around the year 1238 about this process in her *Third Letter to Agnes of Prague*: "Place your mind before the mirror of eternity! Place your soul in the brilliance of glory! Place your heart in the figure of the divine



substance! And transform your entire being into the image of the Godhead Itself through contemplation."

Even though our vocation as Secular Franciscans calls us to an active life of living in the world, serving as a leaven of Gospel values to help transform our world after the mind and heart of Christ, we are also to have this contemplative dimension to our spirituality. Article 8 of the *OFS Rule* exhorts Secular Franciscans to "let prayer and contemplation be the soul of all they are and do." As our model and exemplar of Franciscan Gospel living, Saint Clare can teach us much about being an "active contemplative" in today's world. The regular practice of *Lectio Divina* according to one of the forms our Christian and Franciscan tradition teaches us will provide rich nourishment for living just such a life – during this holy season of Lent and beyond!

Here is a short Lenten prayer:

Lord our God, by the power of your Holy Spirit, we have entered into this Lenten time of penance and conversion, of prayer, fasting and almsgiving, in order to renew our dedication to live the holy Gospel of your Son in the footsteps of St. Francis. We ask for your blessing and guidance so that this holy season may help us to appreciate our vocation more deeply, to embrace it more enthusiastically, and to share it more fully with one another and with all people. Amen.

We invite you to please pray for our upcoming Regional Elections which will be held on **Saturday**, **July 12**, **2025** at the Regional Chapter of Elections at the Villa Maria Center in Springfield. The term of office is three (3) years. The following elected persons will include: Regional Minister, Regional Vice-Minister, Regional Secretary, Regional Treasurer, Regional Formation Director, and one Regional Councilor ["at least one elected Councilor" (NS, article #23.2)].
