



OFS International Statutes Affect Spiritual Assistance

On March 14, 2025 the Regional Ministers and Regional Spiritual Assistants of the United States received the following communication from the Conference of National Spiritual Assistants (CNSA):

Dear Regional Spiritual Assistants and Regional Ministers,

May the Lord give you peace!

The Secular Franciscan Order in November 2024 promulgated International Statutes which have been in force ad experimentum for three years prior including IS 78.2: A Secular Franciscan cannot be appointed Spiritual Assistant to his/her own Fraternity at any level. This clarifies that the altius moderamen cannot be exercised by a member of the same fraternity, contrary to recent practice. According to the national database, there are 31 local fraternities and eleven regional fraternities which are currently served in this manner. There are many other fraternities, local and regional, which do not have all the spiritual assistants they are owed by our obligation to provide altius moderamen.

We are issuing the attached <u>instruction</u> on the implementation of IS 78.2. As part of this instruction, we determined that any appointment of a Secular Franciscan to serve their own fraternity as spiritual assistant will expire on 15 June 2025. We also encourage you to make an adjustment to any of these appointments in advance, if relevant to your region.

The general spiritual assistants have recommended that the relevant friars discuss the issue of spiritual assistance to the OFS where it appears difficult to find a suitable person to serve as spiritual assistant. We hope that some of you will join a future conversation with us and perhaps share ideas even beforehand so that we can better fulfill the responsibilities of the *altius moderamen*.

In the accompanying <u>Instruction</u>, the CNSA provides the following rationale for the restrictions imposed by this statute: "IS 78.2 makes explicit what is implicit in canon law: the *altius moderamen* cannot be exercised by a member of the group that is being moderated; that is, those OFS members who are otherwise suitable and well-prepared to serve as spiritual assistants are ineligible to serve their own local or regional fraternities (CIC 303). The required 'higher' or 'outside moderation' cannot be fulfilled by self-moderation."

The Friars clearly state that "providing spiritual assistance to a fraternity is the responsibility of the First Order and TOR. The ordinary choice for a spiritual assistant should be a friar of the First Order or TOR. While we are blessed with many others helping us provide spiritual assistance, including Secular Franciscans,

this gift that we are to each other in the Franciscan Family creates a 'life-giving union' which fosters a 'vital reciprocity' between the friars and the seculars (Rule 1, GC 89; see also the footnote to GC 85). The friars also lose part of who they are when friars and seculars are not present with each other.

The Provincial Minister or his delegate (in some provinces called *OFS Animator* or *Provincial Spiritual Assistant*) is responsible for providing spiritual assistance. If there is no spiritual assistant appointed, then this delegate is responsible for assisting the fraternity. The local minister should not hesitate to request the delegate's assistance to obtain the proper assistance for the fraternity—whether it is a specific task such as interviewing candidates before profession, or a request for advice."

The CNSA envisions the possibility of the appointment of *remote* Spiritual Assistants whose presence with the fraternity could be facilitated by what they refer to as *Spiritual Liaisons*: "When the spiritual assistant is not able to be present in person most of the time, it may be helpful to a fraternity to have someone who is aware of the perspective and responsibilities of spiritual assistance to remind the fraternity of its obligations and needs as well as to facilitate communication with the spiritual assistant. This becomes even more important in a situation where the fraternity relies on PD [the provincial minister or his delegate], in the absence of an appointed spiritual assistant. We propose that a spiritual liaison (SL) could be appointed from within the fraternity to facilitate this communication. The spiritual liaison must understand the role (responsibilities and perspective) of the spiritual assistant and thus should have completed the spiritual assistance formation appropriate to the role of spiritual assistant."

This is clearly a time of major transition for the way in which spiritual assistance is experienced by many of the local and regional OFS fraternities throughout the United States. Please keep the members of the CNSA in your prayers as they lead us in navigating the new terrain mandated by article 78.2 of the *OFS International Statutes*.


We are gearing up for a changing of the guard as we will have our fraternity chapter of elections on Sunday, May 18th.





Addendum B - A Look Back In Time

I recently read this article from over 7 years ago, in the early years of my experiences in Uganda and with Ugandan Franciscans. I shared this with Gilbert Muhumuza, ofs, who is now our Region's webmaster. At that time I had never met Gilbert in person. His response is below.

The Journey of a Tau Crucifix

<u>Uganda Background</u>. For the last couple of years, St. Margaret of Cortona fraternity has been developing a "twinning" relationship with St. Francis of Assisi fraternity near Mbarara, Uganda. This relationship started following my visit to Uganda in June 2015. We have exchanged messages, photos, and prayers during that time, and St. Margaret of Cortona fraternity last year sent over a couple of boxes of Franciscan-related books. My contact in their local fraternity, Gilbert Muhumuza, OFS, was last year elected to be the <u>YouFra</u> International Councilor for Africa. In his new role, he attended the CIOFS Chapter in Rome (his first plane ride) in November 2017.

The Tau Crucifix. During my trip to the Holy Land in October 2016, I purchased a large beautiful Tau crucifix made of olive wood. This was bought specifically to be donated it to the silent auction at our September 2017 retreat. I was unable to be at our retreat during the silent auction because I was attending the NAFRA Chapter as a delegate for Dcn. Dave. However, I pre-submitted an opening bid on the crucifix merely as a way to set a minimum starting bid. Some understood this as a sign that I wanted the crucifix for myself and thus a fellow Secular purchased the crucifix and then later gave it to me! What a lovely gift ... full of love and joy.

The Tau Crucifix in Uganda. I decided to give the Tau Crucifix to the fraternity in Uganda, and had my good friend, Fr. Julius Turyatoranwa, carry the crucifix to Uganda in December 2017 and arrange for get it to Gilbert. Upon receipt, Gilbert wrote: "Hallo Br. John. Am very praised to share my joy and thanks to you for thinking about me and sending me this gift. On this note, when I went Rome, I wanted to buy one Crucifix for my fraternity but I never had enough money. Now God had my prayers and you bought it for me from Holy Land. This is great. Again, I thank you for this letter you sent to me and thank you for remembering and supporting fraternity of Uganda and community at large. Peace and joy in 2018. Muhumuza Gilbert."





Epilogue. As I was sharing this story during our fraternity's January Gathering with brothers and sisters from our fraternity, an email arrived from Gilbert with pictures and a message:

"Everybody was happy to see Tau Crucifix since it is so not common in our fraternities and even in most Catholic shops. We are the luckiest fraternity to have this. Although every fraternity wished to have one."

God truly works in mysterious ways! The Tau Crucifix is exactly where it was meant to be.
